Prof Eileen Piggot-Irvine. Adjunct Professor at Griffith University and Royal Roads University (Canada). Lead for the ESAR. Previously Vice-President of ALARPM, founder and lead for the NZ AR Network, Director NZ ARCentre. Author of 82 papers, 6 books, too many keynotes and presentations to record!

Prof Lesley Ferkins. Professor, Sport Leadership & Governance at Auckland University of Technology (New Zealand). Director of the AUT Sports Performance Research Institute New Zealand. Committed action researcher and member of the ESAR.

Prof. Shankar Sankaran. Professor of Organizational Project Management at UTS. Authored over 140 papers and supervised 35 doctoral students. Published books, book chapters and edited special issues on action research and action learning. Member of the Editorial Board of ALARA and President of the International Society for the Systems Sciences where he set up its AR SIG. Member of ESAR. Interested in applying systems thinking and AR in organizations.

Prof. Wendy Rowe. Professor and scholar practitioner in School of Leadership at Royal Roads University, Victoria, Canada. Has worked extensively across Canada and United States, in addition to various international locations (Ecuador, India, China, New Zealand, Australia).
